MEET HEATHER NONACA, AREA XVII LEGISLATIVE CHAIR EDUCATIONAL LAW AND POLICY ADVOCATE, ETA MU LEGISLATIVE CHAIR



Heather's Educational Background

Heather Nonaca (No-knock-uh) found her love for teaching while coaching her alma mater band and color guard at Grace M. Davis High School after graduation. She then worked as a tutor and student mentor at Modesto Junior College, where she earned her AA degree. After finishing at MJC, she transferred to CSU, Chico where she earned two bachelor's degrees in Religious Studies and Social Science. She returned

to the Central Valley to pursue her Single-Subject Teaching Credential at CSU, Stanislaus and worked for Modesto Parks and Recreation as a Recreation leader in the afterschool program, working with elementary and middle school students.

Heather then worked at Ronald E. McNair High School in Stockton, for the next eight years, teaching AP US History, World History, and Geography. After the birth of her son in 2018, she made the move to California Virtual Academy, where she has been teaching High School US History for the past two years.

Heather also serves CA DKG as a Bill Evaluator. She was recently awarded the Career/Professional Service Chapter Award and is in her second term as the Area XVII Legislative Chair. She is passionate about inclusive education, fostering critical thinking in her students, supporting local communities, classic cars, traveling the world with her husband, reading with her son, and iced coffee!

When asked about how she became involved in DKG, Heather told her story.



While working at Modesto City Parks and Recreation at Mark Twain Junior High for the afterschool program, Mark Heinzinger came to observe. When Mark was introduced, Heather thought, "How many Heinzingers can there be? It is such a unique name." Although she had never met Mark before, recognizing the name, she went up to him at the end of the session and asked if he knew Kathleen Heinzinger. Mark replied, "That's my wife."

At the time, Kathleen was working at Salida Elementary School and needed some help in her classroom. Mark got Heather in touch with Kathleen, and she started helping in Kathleen's elementary classroom, observing, and using the time towards her credential hours. During that time Heather and Kathleen became close and that's when Kathleen started talking to Heather about Eta Mu and DKG. Later Heather was invited to a meeting and Kathleen introduced her as her former 4th grade student. According to Heather, many people can't say that their relationship with their 4th grade teacher is special. She knows years later that hers really is special. Heather joined Eta Mu in 2016, and soon after took the position of Legislative Chair for the chapter.

When asked what she liked about her position as Legislative Chair, Heather talked about how it relates to her teaching career.

As a history teacher, even before she had the legislative position, Heather always tried to keep tabs on what was happening in the country and around the world, to stay informed. She says, "bringing current events into the classroom to discuss with my students has always been important to me, so I just kind of saw the legislative chair position as an extension of that." To her, the legislative position is as much for the chapter as it is serving a purpose for her in her classroom. The position keeps her informed about what's happening at state level as well. She says, "sometimes we're focused more on what's happening at the national level." Heather really likes how the position has made her "zoom" in specifically on what's happening in our smaller community. She was also excited about Legislative Chair because she had the sense that it was not as popular a chair position as it should be. She feels good just bringing awareness of the position and what it has to offer to the chapter. Heather was thrilled when Area Director Carol Vieira asked her to be the Area Legislative Chair. Heather regularly shares DKG California and International's work on legislature and law with Eta Mu Musings and on the Eta Mu website. She has developed presentations to keep members informed. She wants all DKG members to be aware that we have a lobbyist advocating for women educators and that we can, and should, voice our opinions on legislation affecting California teachers and women.

What are some highlights of your teaching career?

Whenever Heather can get a student excited about history, that's a win for her. When she was teaching at McNair High School, one of the things that she always loved doing with her classes was mock trials. Students had to argue their point of view and they really got passionate about taking their roles seriously. Heather also enjoys conducting Socratic Seminars with her students, which involve reading and discussing articles in detail. She says, "What's great about teaching history is that it's not like math where there's always a right or wrong answer. . . . I always love it when my kids walk away more confused from a discussion than when we started because that lets me know that their critical thinking muscles are kicking in." She often tells her students, "There's not a right or wrong answer here. There are well supported and ill supported arguments. So, if you can make an argument and support it, awesome." Heather also loves it when her students teach her, when they come back and show her something that they've found interesting or that's connected to the content. She loves growing with her students. She says, "I just love fostering curiosity in my students. If I can foster a sense of curiosity about history in my students, that's when I feel like I've really accomplished something."

What are your biggest challenges?



Heather thinks that balancing motherhood and a career and trying to fulfill both of those roles with the same amount of energy and passion is really challenging. She has had to set some boundaries this past year when it comes to work to make sure there's more of a balance between work and family. Heather knows that becoming a mother has made her a better teacher, because she knows from experience what it means to trust



somebody else with your child. She says, "Parents are trusting us with their most precious beings on the planet. Everybody wants what's best for their child. And so, when I have children in my classroom, it makes me even more intentional about doing what's best for the students. I always try to ask myself if my choices are what's best for me or for the student. Is this assignment what's best for students? Is it *really* encouraging critical thinking? Is it *really* teaching them how to write?" While she had always thought of her students as her children, that feeling has just intensified since becoming a mother.

What advice would you give to a new teacher?

"Find a mentor. Get to know the staff at your school and find somebody that is willing to listen and give advice. You don't necessarily have to have the intent of doing whatever they suggest that you do, but it's just nice to have somebody that you can talk to. Somebody that can serve as a sounding board for your ideas and/or concerns. Someone that you can go to when you have a question or when you have ideas. Something as simple as knowing who to ask if you want a certain resource for your classroom. Like, do you know who does the purchase orders? Because teaching can be so isolating. It's you, alone, in a room. You're the only adult in the room in most cases. And so, I think it's just important to make sure that when you're outside of that room, that you start to build a community of people that can help you be better at what you're doing, and that can support you along the way. It may not even be the people you would think of; it might be the librarian, a teacher in a different subject area, the principal's secretary, or it could be the person that serves the meals in the cafeteria." Heather views Eta Mu as an extension of that classroom community and appreciates the knowledge and sense of empowerment that surrounds her within the women of Delta Kappa Gamma. Heather is currently the Area Legislative Chair and has informative presentations on Eta Mu's Website. Current National Legislation to follow:

S. 1585: Improving Mental Health Access for Students Act Improving Mental Health Access for Students Act: This bill requires institutions of higher education (IHEs) that participate in federal student-aid programs to share contact information for suicide prevention resources with students. Sponsor: Sen. Kennedy, John(R-LA) Introduced 05/12/2021; Passed/agreed to in Senate Voice Vote 05/12/2021. Sent to House. Source: Congress.gov

H.R. 5 Equality Act: This bill prohibits discrimination based on sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity in areas including public accommodations and facilities, education, federal funding, employment, housing, credit, and the jury system. Specifically, the bill defines and includes sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity among the prohibited categories of discrimination or segregation. Sponsor: Rep. Cicilline, David N. [D-RI-1] (Introduced 02/18/2021) Cosponsors: (224)Committees: House - Judiciary; Education and Labor; Financial Services; Oversight and Reform; House Administration; Passed in the House 02/25/2021.Latest Action: Senate - 03/17/2021 Committee on the Judiciary.
