

However, this year, I marked my calendar, called in a favor from a colleague to sub my classes, and made my way to Burlingame, looking forward to "Shaping Tomorrow Together." Here's what Convention taught me:

- 2. Wendy Bruce (Eta Mu) is a supportive soul that generously offered to show me around her school's campus (that my Autistic son, Emmet will be attending next year) once we returned from Convention. The offer lifted a giant weight off of my shoulders and I'm so thankful to have one of my sisters at Emmet's school next year.
- 3. Area XVII produces leaders—as exemplified by the election of Kathleen Heinzinger and Patricia Elston to the Nominations Committee. Congratulations!
- 4. Suzanne Roy (DKG CA Corresponding Secretary) is a hoot to have a drink with, especially when you're being serenaded by a barbershop quartet.
- 5. Saying goodbye to fallen sisters is tough, but honoring them at the Convention is a beautiful way of acknowledging all the ways that they brightened their communities during their lives.
- 6. Being surrounded by educators that have decades of stories to tell, advice to offer, and friendship to gain, is exactly the type of energy boost that tired educators need in May.

The Convention also gave me an opportunity to lead a break-out session on "6 Ways Google Forms Can Support your Chapter," which many members of my own chapter were able to attend to offer their support. When I talk to fellow educators (and my own biological sister, who is a member of Tau, but did NOT attend our State Conference), my first statement is this: I have NEVER IN MY LIFE been surrounded by so many super smart women who were NOTHING BUT POSITIVE, EVER! Every single person I met was helpful, supportive, and genuinely wanted to hear what I had to say. It was amazing meeting so many like-minded women, hearing some outstanding speakers with fantastic stories and information to share. This experience came at a very important time for me, and completely recharged me and helped to finish my school year on a positive note!

During sessions, I learned about the educational journeys of some superlative women—one who finally got her PhD at the age of 60! (Is there really still time for me to do that and have it pay off? Does having it pay for itself really matter if it's something I want to do?). Connie Rensink of Texas shared the incredible opportunity to go to a highly competitive leadership seminar (called IGNITE) where participants earn the equivalent of an MBA in two weeks. This program occurs in Texas and is purported to be INTENSE—and just right up my alley! The program is offered only in odd years now and the deadline for this is December 15, 2023. Finally, I attended as many events and meals as possible and enjoyed every moment! Every single woman I came across was uplifting, cheerful and ready to learn and grow with our sisters! **Vision:** All area legislative chairs and chapter legislative representatives will disperse legislative information in order to empower members to be legislative and policy advocates.

#### **Initial Steps:**

- Identify chapter representatives
- Lead a Zoom training in October to provide chapter representatives with a toolkit for successfully engaging their chapter members and fulfilling their responsibilities.
- Promote the DKG National Legislative Seminar in Washington, D.C. (March 10-13, 2024).





Greetings Sisters! In June I attended the **Summer Leadership Planning Session** as a new member of the **DKG CA Educational Law and Policy Committee**. I had a great time meeting my fellow committee members and enjoyed being surrounded by such an amazing group of educated, talented, professional, and inspiring women. We have great plans in store for our committee to help empower our members at the chapter level to support DKG CA's legislative platform. I can't wait to share them with you later this year.

**Breaking News!** Gov. Gavin Newsom signed the 2023-24 State Budget package on July 10, following an agreement reached with the Legislature in late June. The budget includes more than \$108 billion for public education and a historic 8.22% Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) – the highest since the 1970s.
