

IN MEMORIAM BETTY HARRELL



March 28, 1929 - April 10, 2023

Betty Harrell was a committed and valued member of Eta Mu Chapter for 45 years. She held every leadership office in the chapter--President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer. She also served as DKG Area XVII Director.

As a long-time member who held all the leadership roles, Betty knew all the "ins and outs" of DKG—even the most obscure rules that obtained in the 1970s and 1980s! She was always the authority. I learned she was a taskmaster when I succeeded her as treasurer of Eta Mu Chapter. She was generous with her time, teaching me the responsibilities and procedures.

She was also very strict when it came to the yearly auditing of the chapter's financial records which she did after her tenure as treasurer. She was very hospitable, inviting me into her home for these sessions.

I first met Betty in the 1970s when she was the Special Day Class Teacher at Muncy School. She was a skilled, dedicated, and caring teacher. Her contributions were recognized as she received numerous awards, including 1971 Stanislaus Area Special Education Teacher of the Year, 1990 School Bell Award, and 1997 AAUW Grant Award.

Betty contributed to her community as docent at the McHenry Museum and McHenry Mansion. She also belonged to quilting and antique clubs.

Betty was proud of her family and talked often of them. Into her old age, she endured the long train trip to Tacoma to see her son, a trip that was normally 13 hours but could take as long as 24 hours.

Betty Harrell will remain legendary in the annals of Eta Mu Chapter. May she rest in eternal peace. Well done, good and faithful servant!



From Betty's Member Bio and Obituary:

Betty led a full life as an educator, a parent, a DKG member, and was involved in the local community.

Betty had an A. A. from Santa Rose Junior College, a B. A. from the College of the Pacific, now UOP, and from 1951 to 1980 Betty took Professional Advancement Courses from CSU, Stanislaus. She held 3 Life Credentials; General Elementary, a Credential to teach Mentally Retarded and a Credential to teach Learning Handicapped. Betty taught 1st grade, 2nd grade and 2nd/3rd combination at Burbank Elementary School and Franklin Elementary School in Modesto City Schools. For 26 years she taught Special Education in the Stanislaus Union School. Betty was the Stanislaus Area Special Education 1971 Teacher of the Year, the School Bell Award in 1990 and was AAUW Named Grant Awardee in 1997.

Betty was initiated into Eta Mu in October 1977. She was Chapter Vice President 1984-1986 and for the 1986 -1988 biennium, Betty was President. Then Treasurer 1988-1994. She also served as Chapter Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Parliamentarian, Chairman of Professional Affairs Committee, Chairman of the Finance Committee, a member of the Nominations Committee and the Communications Committees as well as an Auditor. Treasurer 1988-1994. Betty has also been Corresponding Secretary, Parliamentarian, Chairman of Professional Affairs Committee, Chairman of the Finance Committee, a member of the Nominations Committee and the Communications Committee as well as Auditor. Betty served at the state level as Area XVII Director from 1989-1991. She enjoyed being a DKG member and remained active in Eta Mu until her sight failed.

Betty is survived by sons James (Chris) and Jeffrey (Linda), grandchildren Amiee (Eric), Bryan, Gregory (Tommy Jo), Jon, and her step grandchildren Josh (Julie), Matt, Ashley, and Andy. She had five great grandsons and three great granddaughters. Betty was preceded in death by husbands James Hiett and Marshel Harrell.



Betty was very active in the local community. She was a Docent at the McHenry Mansion and a volunteer in the Gift Store as well as a Docent at the McHenry Museum. She was a member of County Crossroads Quilters, CRTA, Wooden Nickel Antique Club, AAUW and AARP. Among Betty's interest were quilting and antiquing. DKG Forum News:

In March, The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), awarded 15 states each with \$1 million, one-year Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) planning grants. This announcement marks the first time these planning grants have been available since the program began in 2015.

The 15 states selected are Alabama, Delaware, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Mississippi, Montana, North Carolina, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Ohio, Rhode Island, Vermont, West Virginia. In 2024, up to 10 of those will participate in the CCBHC Medicaid demonstration program and receive enhanced Medicaid reimbursement.

"The expansion of Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics is part of President Biden's commitment to expand and strengthen equitable behavioral health for all Americans," said HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra. "These clinics serve anyone who requests care for mental health or substance use, regardless of their ability to pay, and connect people to the care they need."
