# MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



#### Mary Lou Dieterich An educator who has made an impact By Debbie Mar, V.P. Membership

Few people have had the honor of having a school named after them. Our featured member this month, Mary Lou Dieterich, had no clue whatsoever that she was in the running. When the Stanislaus Union School Board made the announcement, she was in utter shock! Perhaps the many who knew and worked with her were not as surprised, but this should give us a clue as to the kind of person she is. She is known among her peers



for her deep compassion for children with reading disabilities and her dedication to the teachers under her leadership.

Mary Lou joined ETA MU back in 1995, a year before she retired. She was invited by our charter member, Adele Little, who at the time was project manager for Stanislaus Union School District. She became an active member and had served for two years as treasurer. Now she believes she is older and slower and is reluctant to Zoom as it seems to be the only method of meeting together.

When asked about the highlight of her teaching career, it conjured up memories of her first teaching assignment in a small town in North Dakota. It was a mixed grade level schoolhouse with 15 students ranging from 1<sup>st</sup> to 3rd grades. Her job description also included teaching choir to about 8 high school football players. At the time, the coach insisted the boys take her class. Although reluctant at first, they were very respectful and did try to participate. Later, Mary Lou and her husband moved to Minnesota where she taught a 2<sup>nd</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> grade combination class to 24 quiet children. After the birth of their first child, Karen, her husband, Bob, was hired by Modesto City Schools. Since they needed to hire substitute teachers, she was hired as a sub at Lincoln Elementary School for 6 weeks. Her principal was Alberta Martone. Later she continued to sub for 4-5 more years while also working on her credential. She recalls being sent all over Modesto wherever a sub was needed. "It was the best education I could have had," said Mary Lou. By observing how other teachers managed their classrooms, she gained the much-needed experience she felt she was missing. Some teachers were extremely organized while others were sloppy. She was determined that she would have a well -organized

classroom for her students. She also taught piano in her spare time until her son was 5 years old and had started kindergarten. Bob had a buddy named, Ken Cline, who was then the Principal of Chrysler Elementary School. He suggested Mary Lou come to see him. She ended up at the district office with Superintendent George Eisenhut and signed a contract. She spent 22 years at Chrysler, first as a classroom teacher, then teaching Reading, Math, and Language to Title 1 students and Early Childhood. She eventually moved up to the position of Vice Principal and shortly after, became Principal. Since Mary Lou had not learned to read until she was in third grade, she has had a real compassion for helping children with the same handicap.

Her greatest challenge was in teaching reading to older children, especially the ones who at 4<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grades were still not able to read. These were the ones with whom she would begin with the structure of reading, guiding them step by step. She remembers fondly a 6<sup>th</sup> grade boy who could not read. He was extremely interested in Outer Space. At the time she had a cousin who worked for NASA. She arranged to have him bring her books about Space to draw him into reading. He was quite fascinated by them. Unfortunately, his problems were too great. She heard later from his sister that he had passed away. This broke her heart as she had become so attached to him.

Her advice to new teachers starting out in education is go out and get as much experience as possible before you take on a full-time job in Teaching. Also, ask older teachers whom you have confidence in-pick their minds and listen to their advice.

During the past year, Mary Lou has spent time with 3 different groups. One group is her Bible Study at her church, another is a group of neighbors who get together on Friday nights for goodies and drinks and the third group is her former core staff people from Agnes Baptist Elementary School consisting of the Computer Teacher, the Secretary, the School Improvement Secretary, and the In-School Suspension Aide. She also attends church on Sundays.

Looking back, Mary Lou still wonders how she attained the honor of having a school named after her. "I was never on for a show. Maybe it was because I was loyal to my students and treated School Board Members the same way," she said. She was a strong advocate for the teachers, insisting she would not discuss a matter with the parents without the teacher present. Or was it perhaps it was the DEFINITIVE DISCIPLINE PLAN the school had in place which had detention for minor offenses and In-School Suspensions for major offences.


Her Special Awards include:

In 2013 she was named among the Outstanding Women Award for Stanislaus County.

In 2015 She received the Betty Mulnix Award from the Literacy Network of Stanislaus County.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Greetings Sisters! Here are a few Legislative Updates ("Nonaca's News!") that I'd like to share with you: DKG CA, Educational Law and Policy News:

1. May Convention Legislative Sessions: A Legislative Update session will be offered. You can find more information about the convention at this link: <u>https://tinyurl.com/yu7avf2u</u>

Legislative Study Session: June 22-24, 2021, Sacramento, CA**: Learn about the legislative process, become informed of educational issues addressed in current legislation, and visit with your legislators. - AB 551 (Rodriguez, F) Teachers' Retirement System: individual retirement plans: administration. (I-2/10/2021)
- AB 552 (Quirk Silva) Integrated School-Based Behavioral Health Partnership Program. (I-2/10/2021
- SB 70 (Rubio, S) Elementary education: kindergarten. (A-3/2/2021) Status: Senate Education Committee
- SB 229 (Dahle) Pupil health: mental health services: grants. (A-3/9/2021)
- SB 364 (Skinner) Pupil meals: Free School Meals For All Act of 2021. (A-3/10/2021)
- SB 579 (Allen) School safety: bias-related discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying: model handout. (I-2/18/2021)


# AREA XVII NEWS and LOCAL EVENTS

# Stanislaus County Commission for Women celebrated the outstanding women in our county on March 21


